Any Rotary Club which is, itself, carrying out or supporting projects connected with the environment.

Schools & Youth Groups

*Projects, connected with the environment, run by schools or youth groups. There **must** be some Rotary involvement*

International

Any Rotary Club or District involved in an environmental sustainable project outside RIBI

JUDGING CRITERIA

Effectiveness

The aims of the project should be clearly stated and outcomes be capable of assessment

Sustainability

- ↻ Whilst projects may involve service to the community or international aid, sustainability should be a primary objective.
- ↻ The carbon footprint of a project should be taken into account as should the preservation of biodiversity.
- ↻ Projects should encourage, by example or through education, the adoption of sustainable behaviours and lifestyles.

Innovation

New concepts and ideas are valuable and will be recognised.

Community Impact

Projects based on private property or within a private organisation should be such as to enable the public to enjoy and benefit from the outcomes.

Rotarian Involvement

In the case of entries by clubs there should be evidence of personal involvement by members.

Adoptability

The project should be capable of replication by others without specialist support or the incurring of considerable expense.
